SCOUTING PROGRAMS

OUR PROGRAMS

Scouting is for all ages! It begins for youth as young as 5 years old in Kindergarten, and for many, carries on for a lifetime of Scouting. The Scouting experience is divided into different programs according to age and activities.

CUB SCOUTS Ages 5-10 (Grades K-5)

Cub Scouting is a year-round program uniquely designed to meet the need of young boys and girls and their parents. The program offers fun and challenging activities that promote character development and physical fitness. Service projects, ceremonies, games, and other activities guide youth through the core values and give them a sense of personal achievement.

SCOUTS BSA Ages 10-17 (Grades 6+)

Most people associate Scouting with outdoor adventure – and with good reason. Scouting is an outdoor program designed to develop character, citizenship, and fitness with the Scout Oath and Law as a guide. Scouting helps youth develop into well rounded citizens. Through the advancement program, a Scout can progress in rank through achievements, gaining additional knowledge and responsibilities.

VENTURING Ages 13-20 (Grades 9+)

Venturing is a program for young men and women. It is one of the fastest growing programs in the Scouting America. The purpose of Venturing is to provide experiences to help young people mature and become responsible and caring adults. Young people in Venturing learn leadership skills and participate in challenging outdoor activities. Venturing focuses resources that help a community organization provide wholesome, flexible, well-rounded, challenging activities tailor-made for teenage youth.

SEA SCOUTS Ages 13-20 (Grades 9+)

Sea Scouts was organized to address members' boating skills and promote knowledge of our maritime heritage. Sea Scout units, called "ships," focus on sailing and cruising either sailboats or power vessels. During the boating seasons, Sea Scouts learn to maintain and operate the vessel, with a focus on learning the safe and proper methods of handling boats. Sea Scouts also learn the meaning of buoys and lights, how to take advantage of wind and tide, and how to drop anchor or approach a dock. Most ships hold formal meetings conducted in either full dress or work uniforms. Swimming, lifesaving, first aid, Coast Guard Auxiliary Sailing and Seamanship, and cardiopulmonary resuscitation courses are taught by our own officers. The state safe boating course is also offered by many ships. Occasionally movies are shown, contests between crews are held, or internship visits are arranged.



EXPLORING Ages 13-20 (Grades 9+)

Exploring is a program for young men and women. Exploring units, called "posts," focus on a single career field, such as law enforcement, fire/rescue, medical and are sponsored by a local government or business entity. Young adults involved in Exploring will gain practical knowledge and experience in a career and engage in a program of activities centered on career opportunities, life skills, citizenship, character development, and leadership experiences to encourage the development of the whole person. They also have opportunities to take on leadership roles and have a chance to learn and grow in a supportive, caring, and fun environment.




Recruitment Drive: Kickstart the scouting year with a focus on welcoming new Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, and Venturers.





ADULT OUTDOOR TRAINING



BALOO

BALOO stands for Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation. This is an overnight program for CUB SCOUT leaders to prepare them to lead pack or den camping. These courses are offered by the local district (you can attend a BALOO course offered by any district).



IOLS

IOLS stands for Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills. This is an overnight course for SCOUTS BSA leaders, particularly Scoutmasters and Assistant Scoutmasters. This course is offered by the local district (you can attend an IOLS course offered by any district).

SAFETY

ADDITIONAL RESOURCES

In Scouting, we will not compromise the safety of our youth, volunteers, and employees. Safety is a value that must be taught and reinforced at every opportunity. We are all responsible and must hold each other accountable to provide a safe environment for all participants.

WE ARE COMMITTED TO ABUSE PREVENTION BY UTILIZING:

- Mandatory youth protection training
- Criminal background checks
- Banning one-on-one adult and youth interactions
- Mandatory reporting of suspected abuse to law enforcement
- A volunteer screening database

We are committed to injury and illness prevention by integrating safety measures in our handbooks, literature, and training materials including the Guide to Safe Scouting. We expect leaders to use the four points of SAFE when delivering the program.

SAFE SCOUTING MEASURES INCLUDE:

- Youth are Supervised by qualified and trustworthy adults who set the example for safety
- Activities are Assessed for risks
- Pre-requisite Fitness and skill levels are confirmed before participation.
- Appropriate Equipment is utilized, and Environmental conditions are monitored

HOW TO REPORT AN INCIDENT IN SCOUTING

When incidents do occur, we expect a timely, clear, and complete incident report. We are committed to learning from the data and modifying program guidance for the prevention of future occurrence. Prompt reporting of incidents helps make Scouting safer for all. Incident report forms and instructions are found at Scouting.org/health-and-safety/incident-report

STEP 1: IMMEDIATE SAFETY	 When an incident occurs, the safety of everyone involved takes precedence. Follow these crucial steps: Conduct a rapid assessment to identify potential injuries or hazards. Provide first aid as needed and seek medical help promptly. If necessary, contact 911 immediately. If the situation warrants, move individuals to a safer area to mitigate immediate risks.
STEP 2: GRASP THE FULL SITUATION	 Understanding the incident in its entirety empowers you to respond effectively: Gather comprehensive information about what happened to establish a clear understanding. If minors are involved, inform parents and guardians of the situation promptly.
STEP 3: Document the incident thoroughly	 Accurate documentation is key to addressing incidents comprehensively: Collect all available information: document the who, what, when, where, and why. (Resource below: Incident Reporting: Gathering the Information) Construct a timeline that outlines the sequence of events leading up to and following the incident. Include the names of all individuals involved and detail the actions taken to address the situation. Enhance your documentation with photographs of the scene and witness statements.
STEP 4: Notify the local council	 Staying in touch with the local Council is crucial for transparency and proper record-keeping: Notify the local Council about the incident promptly.
STEP 5: Follow up with care	 Continuing to provide support and care after the initial response is essential: Maintain open communication with the families of those affected by the incident. Address any questions or concerns they may have and ensure they feel supported throughout.

GET INVOLVED

SUPPORT YOUR SCOUT BY SUPPORTING YOUR COUNCIL

Help build the next generation of leaders as a volunteer. By volunteering with Scouting America, you will work with youth to improve the communities we serve. Scouting volunteers come to Scouting from a variety of backgrounds and experiences. People from just about every occupation imaginable are involved in leading youth to become responsible, caring, competent citizens. You'll also discover that Scout volunteering will enable you to learn new skills and build lifelong friendships while giving back your community.

VOLUNTEER POSITIONS

Scouting relies on adult volunteers to promote our mission. There are a variety of volunteer positions working directly with youth or supporting those who do. Positions vary greatly in time commitment from year-round and seasonal to a few hours a week or a few hours a year. All volunteers must go through an application process that includes a criminal background check requiring a Social Security number.

LEADER TRAINING

All courses needed to be a fully trained leader are available online through my.Scouting.org. Steps to set up a my.Scouting.org account are available in each new leader's packet. The council and each district conduct additional trainings throughout the year, such as University of Scouting. Before individuals can register as an adult volunteer, they must complete the Youth Protection Training.

MERIT BADGE COUNSELOR

Share your experience and interests with Scouts by becoming a merit badge counselor. To be a merit badge counselor, complete a Scouting America adult registration application and specific training available at **my.Scouting.org**. This prepares you to guide scouts through badge requirements while fostering a safe learning environment. Once registered and trained, you can mentor Scouts, contributing to their personal growth and development through shared expertise and encouragement.

FUNDING YOUR PROGRAM

Generating funds to support your local Scouting program is a major focus of Scouting units and their committees. Before undertaking a fundraising activity, you need to receive approval from the Pine Tree Council.

The approval process helps to ensure that fundraising efforts comply with applicable local, state, and federal laws as well as the national policies. It also helps ensure that your fundraising efforts do not create unanticipated legal or tax issues for families, leaders, or chartered organizations.

Getting a fundraiser approved involves a specific process designed to ensure that all fundraising activities align with Scouting America's goals, values, and policies. Here's a general outline of the steps a unit should follow to get a fundraiser approved:

1. UNDERSTAND THE SCOUTING AMERICA'S FUNDRAISING POLICIES:

Before planning a fundraiser, familiarize yourself with Scouting America's fundraising guidelines. These can be found in official literature, such as the "Guide to Safe Scouting" and the "Unit Money-Earning Application" instructions. This will help ensure your proposed fundraiser complies with Scouting America policies.

2. PLAN YOUR FUNDRAISER:

Develop a detailed plan for your fundraising activity. This plan should include the purpose of the fundraiser, the method of fundraising, a budget, how the funds will be used, and who will be responsible for managing the fundraiser and the funds collected.

3. FILL OUT THE UNIT MONEY-EARNING APPLICATION:

Scouting America requires units to submit a "Unit Money-Earning Application" for most fundraising activities. This form asks for details about the fundraiser, including its purpose, financial goals, and specifics about how the fundraiser will be conducted. Be sure to complete this form thoroughly and accurately.

4. OBTAIN NECESSARY APPROVALS:

Before submitting the application to the Council, you must obtain approval from your unit's committee and chartered organization. They will review your fundraiser plan to ensure it aligns with both the unit's and Scouting America's objectives and policies.

5. SUBMIT THE APPLICATION TO YOUR LOCAL COUNCIL:

Once you have all the necessary approvals, submit the "Unit Money-Earning Application" to the Council for review. Include any additional information or documentation they may require.

6. WAIT FOR APPROVAL:

The Council will review the application to ensure the fundraiser complies with Scouting America policies and does not conflict with council-wide fundraising activities. This process may take some time, so plan accordingly and submit your application well in advance of your proposed fundraising start date.

7. CONDUCT YOUR FUNDRAISER ACCORDING TO BSA POLICIES:

Once approved, conduct your fundraising activity as outlined in your application and in accordance with all Scouting America policies. Keep accurate records of income and expenses, and ensure the funds are used appropriately.



Kennebec Valley District – serving Franklin, Kennebec, Lincoln, Knox and Somerset Counties.


Abnaki District – serving Androscoggin, Oxford and Sagadahoc Counties.




